How the Program Works



- ★ When invited by principals, **Reading Reform Foundation** consultants go to the classrooms of teachers who have taken a Reading Reform Foundation course. The consultants provide demonstrations and coach the teachers on how to teach reading, writing, spelling, and comprehension using a phonics-based, multisensory approach. This training takes place approximately 60 times over the whole school year.
- ★ Students are taught not only to read words but to examine them for their roots and meanings, allowing for more thoughtful reading and understanding.
